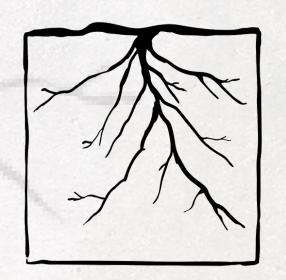

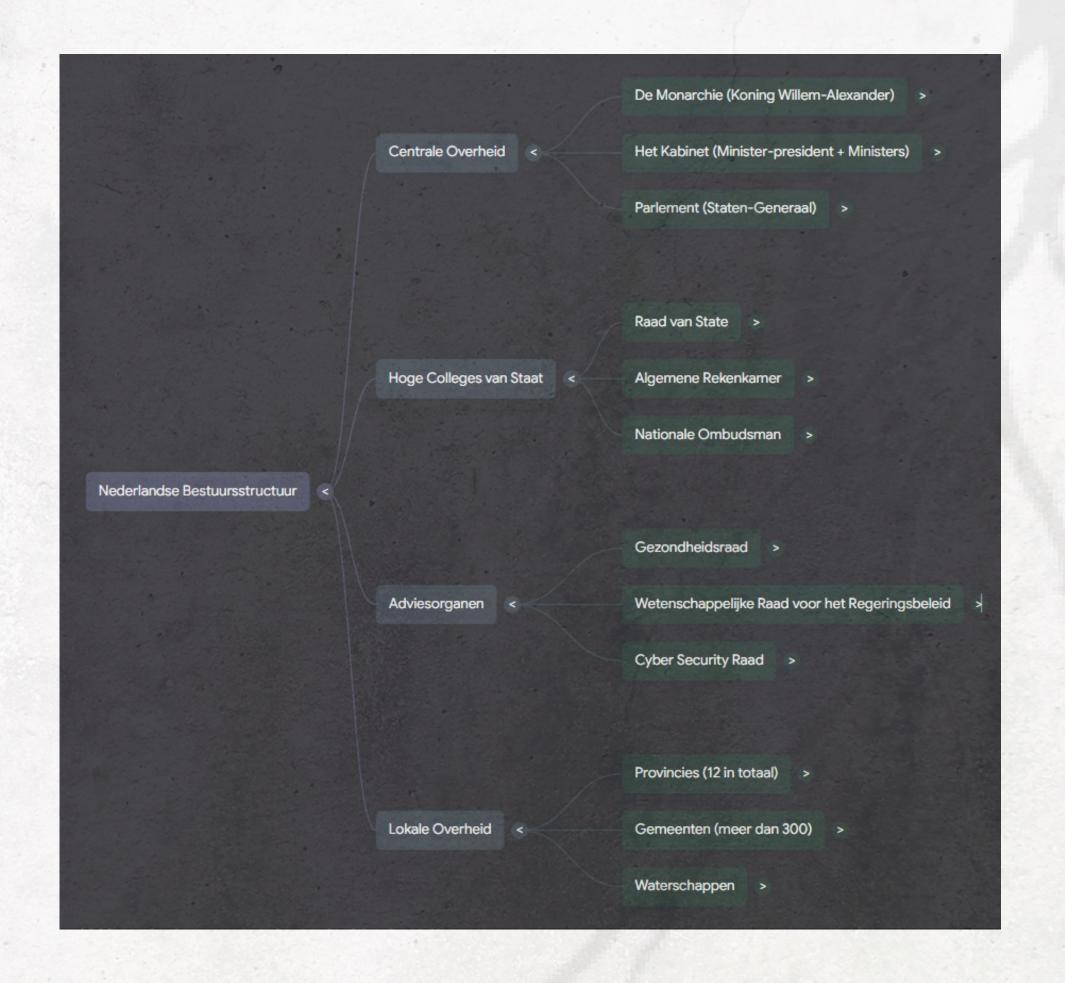
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| THE POLITICAL SYSTEM IN THE NETHERLANDS | KEY CHARACTERISTICS OF THE DUTCH SYSTEM:

- THE NETHERLANDS IS A CONSTITUTIONAL MONARCHY AND A PARLIAMENTARY DEMOCRACY.
- THE KING IS THE HEAD OF STATE, BUT HIS ROLE IS CEREMONIAL.
- REAL POWER LIES WITH ELECTED OFFICIALS.
- IT IS A CONSENSUS-BASED SYSTEM; MULTIPLE PARTIES WORK TOGETHER TO GOVERN IN ONE COALITION.

THE STRUCTURE OF THE DUTCH SYSTEM:

The Netherlands is governed by various political bodies on different levels:



DIRECTLY ELECTED BODIES IN THE NETHERLANDS

Body	Who elects them?	What they do (short)
House of Representatives (Tweede Kamer)	All citizens (national elections, every 4 years)	Makes laws, controls the government, and represents the people.
Provincial States (Provinciale Staten)	Citizens of each province (every 4 years)	Decide on regional matters; elect the Senate.
Municipal Councils (Gemeenteraden)	Citizens of each municipality (every 4 years)	Decide on local issues like housing, welfare, and services.
Water Boards (Waterschappen)	Citizens in water districts (every 4 years)	Manage water safety, dikes, sewage, and flood control.

PARLIAMENT AND SENATE (TWEEDE KAMER & EERSTE KAMER)

Understanding the Dutch Parliament Key Points:

1- Tweede Kamer (House of Representatives) – 150 members, directly elected by the people, every 4 years, a 76 seats majority is needed, Main legislative body.

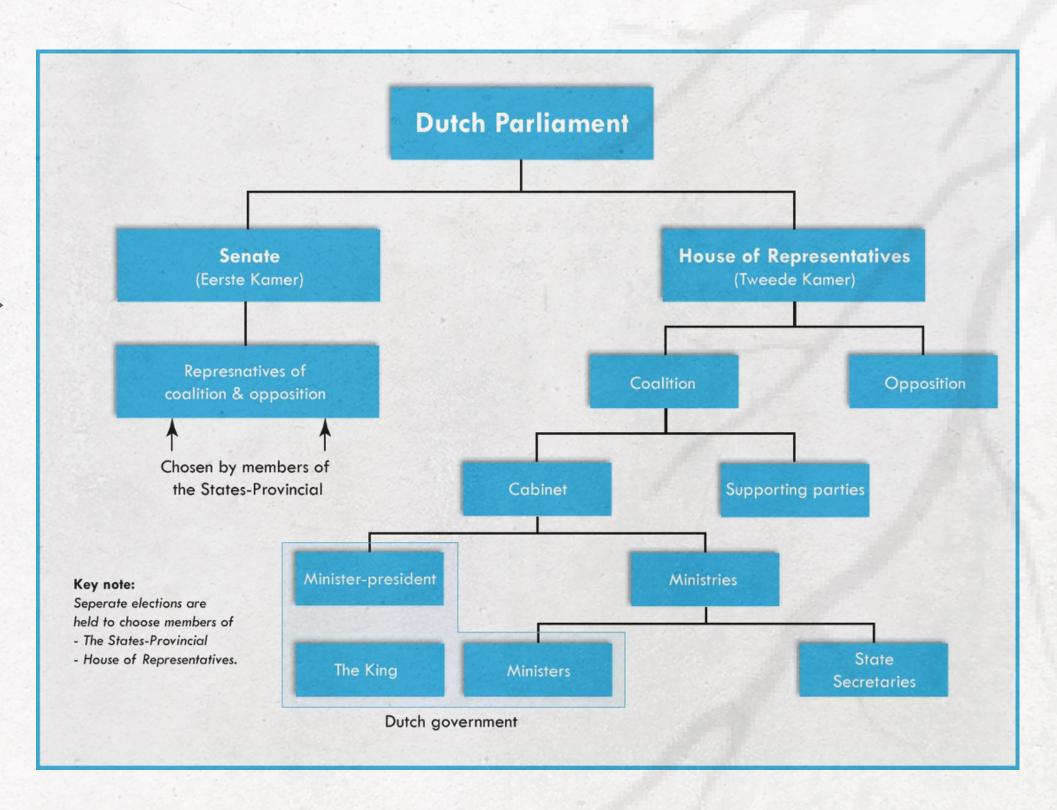
Historical note: since 1919, all citizens 18+ can vote. Key Functions

- Make laws →Submitmotions, debates, amends, votes on bills (together with cabinet & Senate).
- Control the government → questions ministers, monitors decisions, can force resignation.
- Represent the people → brings citizens' concerns and ideas into politics.

2 - Eerste Kamer (Senate) – 75 members, indirectly elected by provincial councils every 4 years

Key Functions

- Approve or reject laws → checks bills after the Tweede Kamer; cannot amend them.
- Check quality of legislation → looks at legality, feasibility, and consistency.
- Monitor government policy (limited) → debates and written questions on main policy lines.



COALITION FORMATION

Why do Dutch parties always work together? **Key Points:**

- 1- No single party usually gets a majority (76 seats).2- After elections, parties negotiate to form a coalition (this can take weeks or months).
- 3- Verkenner, Informateur & Formateur special roles in coalition formation.

 - Verkenner → explores possible coalition options.
 Informateur → leads negotiations between parties to reach an agreement.
 - Formateur → usually the future PM, assigns ministries and selects ministers.
 - Since 2012 → these roles are appointed by the Tweede Kamer, not the King

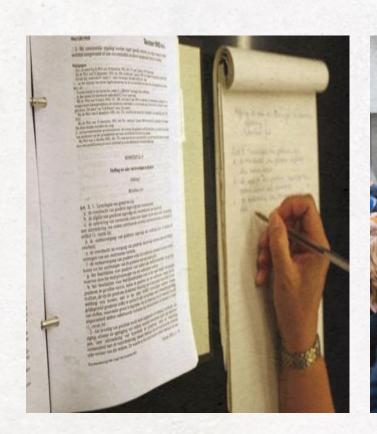
4- The coalition agreement sets the core goals and policy direction for the new government.
I.e. reduction in unemployment, a cleaner environment without damaging the economy, more money for education



POLICY-MAKING PROCESS

How are decisions made? Key Points:

- 1- The Cabinet or MPs propose laws.
- 2- Tweede Kamer debates, amends, and votes (usually on Cabinet proposals).
- 3- The Eerste Kamer approves or rejects them.
- 4- Many policies come from coalition agreements, so voting matters!





POLITICAL PARTICIPATION – PARTIES & MEMBERS

Who can join politics and how? **Key Points:**

1- Proportional Representation Without a Threshold Tweede Kamer operates under a pure proportional representation system with a single nationwide list.

Each seat corresponds to approximately 0.67 % of the votes.

This allows even very small parties to enter parliament.

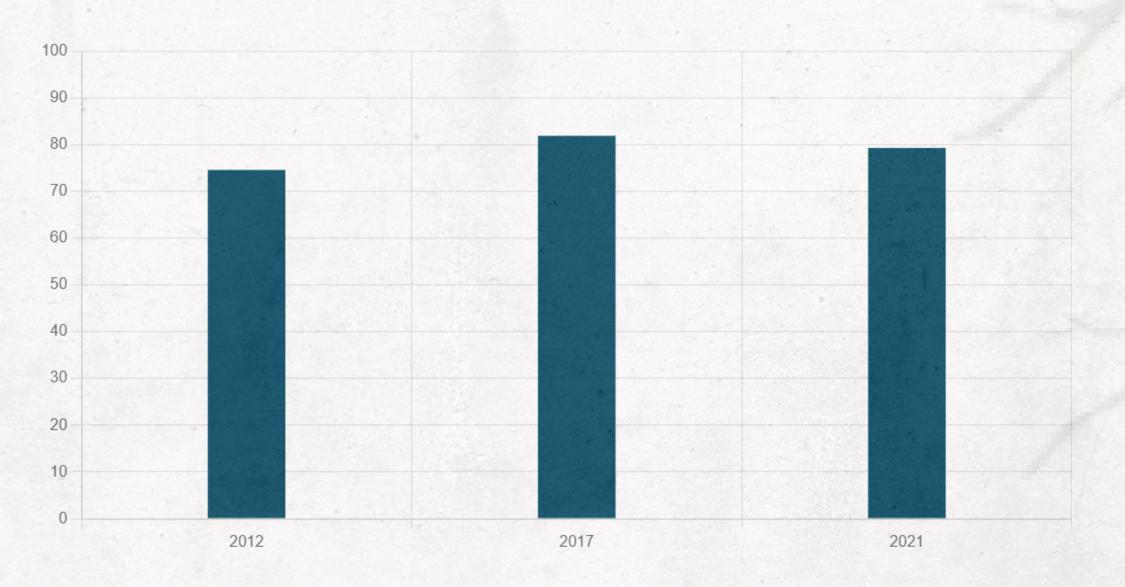
(13,473,750 eligible voters * 0,67% = 90.274,125 votes are a seat at theparliament) 4- Many policies come from coalition agreements, so voting matters!

2- Parties need to register with the Electoral Council (Kiesraad) and meet eligibility requirements.

3- Each party has a list of candidates, and voters choose among these during

elections.

4- Members of Parliament (MPs) represent people, propose laws, and hold the government accountable.



Voter Turnout: 77.8%

The voter turnout for the Parliamentary Election in Netherlands 2023 was 77.8%

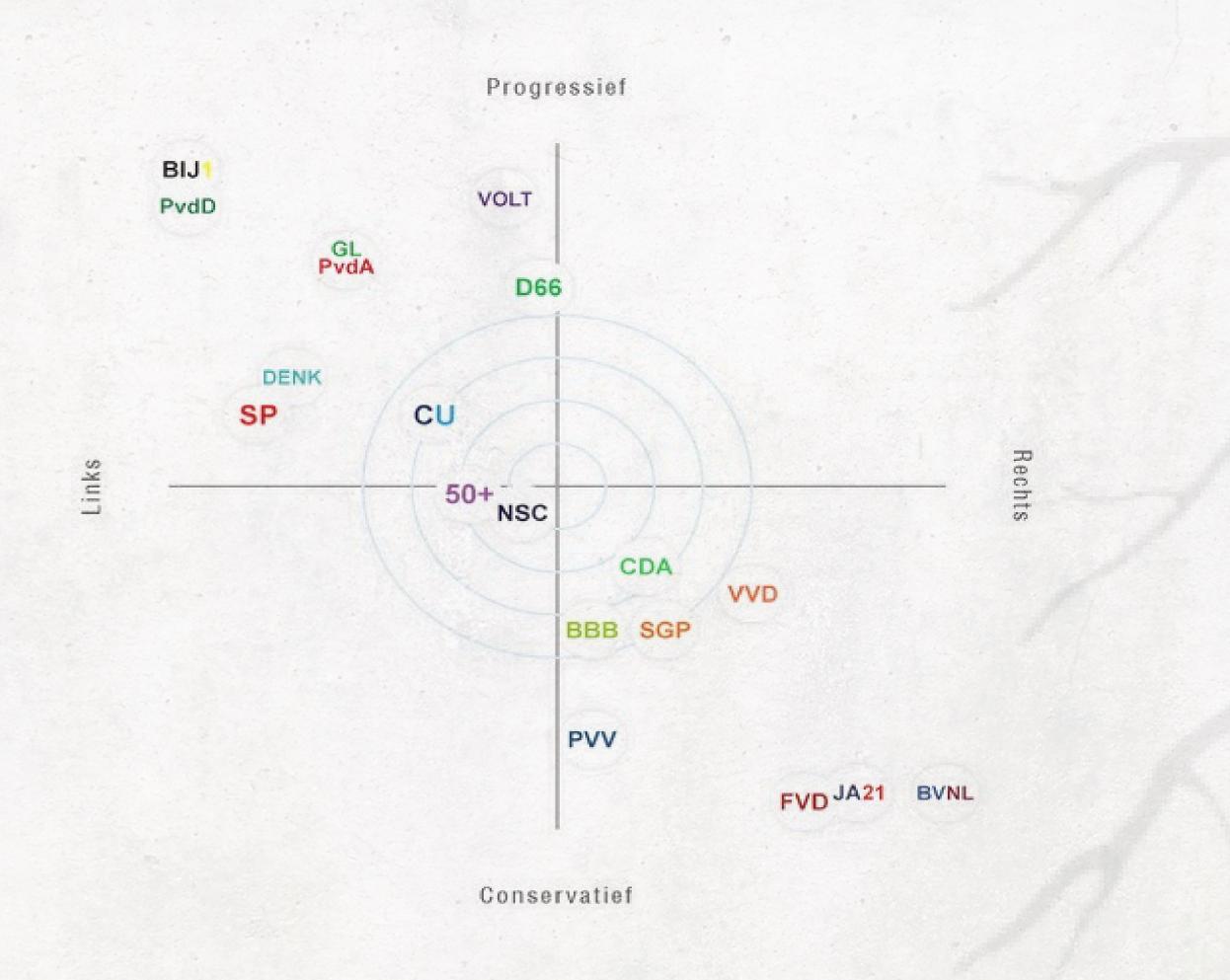

VOTING AND YOUR VOICE

Why your vote matters! **Key Points:**

- If you have Dutch citizenship, you have the right to vote in national elections.
 Direct Election: Members are elected directly by the people.
 Party List Vote: Voters choose between party lists instead of individuals.
 Proportional System: Seats are distributed in proportion to votes received.
 One Round: The election is decided in a single round of voting.

- 6- Free Elections: are free, fair and competitive.

SUMMARY & MOTIVATION

Get Informed. Get Involved. { Gebruik je Stem! } Key Message:

- 1- Get informed → learn about party programs and plans.
- 2- Cast your vote → choose the party that best represents you.
- 3- Tweede Kamer is elected \rightarrow your party wins seats in parliament.
- 4- A coalition is formed \rightarrow your party may join the governing coalition.
- 5- Government is created \rightarrow ministers are appointed, possibly from your party.
- 6- Laws are proposed and debated \rightarrow shaped by coalition agreements and party priorities, including your party.
- 7- Policies affect daily life \rightarrow decisions made in parliament and government bring change to society, and to you.
